Basis for Opinion

Management's responsibility for the financial statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with the Danish Financial Statements Act. Management is also responsible for such internal control as Management deems necessary to prepare financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, Management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements, unless Management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Responsibilities of the statutory auditor for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Contingent liabilities

As part of the United Camping Group's bond financing, a number of companies within the United Camping Group, including First Camp Danmark A/S, have provided a guarantee for the issuing company United Camping AB's liabilities within the bond terms, including interest payments and repayment of the loan amount on loans. More information about the bond financing can be found in United Camping AB's annual report.

Joint taxation liability

The Group's Danish companies are jointly and severally liable for tax on the Group's jointly taxed income and for any withholding taxes such as dividend tax, etc.

Tax due on the Group's jointly taxed income is DKK 0.0 thousand as of the balance sheet date.

Pledges and collateral

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None.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The annual report of First Camp Danmark A/S for 2019/20 has been presented in accordance with the provisions of the Danish Financial Statements Act for companies in reporting class B with the addition of rules from reporting class C.

The annual report has been prepared in accordance with the following accounting policies.

INCOME STATEMENT

Revenue

Revenue from the sale of camping services and commercial goods is recognised in the income statement, provided delivery and transfer of risk to the purchaser have taken place prior to the end of the year. Revenue is recognised exclusive of VAT and net of discounts related to the sale.

Other operating income

Other operating income includes accounting items of a secondary nature with regard to the Company's activities, including profits from the sale of intangible and tangible fixed assets.

Cost of goods sold

Cost of goods sold includes costs incurred to achieve the revenue for the year. These include direct and indirect costs for raw materials and consumables.

Other external expenses

Other external expenses include other production, sales, delivery and administration costs, including costs for energy, marketing, premises, bad debts, leasing costs, etc.

Staff costs

Staff costs include wages and salaries, including holiday pay and pensions, as well as other social security costs, etc. for the Company's employees. Deduction has been made under staff costs for repayments received from public authorities.

Income from investments in subsidiaries

Dividends from equity interests are recognised in the financial year in which the dividend is declared. In the case of disposals, any profit is recognised when the economic rights attached to the equity interests sold are transferred, but no earlier than when the profit has been realised or is regarded as realisable. Moreover, realised losses other than impairments are included where identified.

Financial income and expenses

Financial income and expenses include interest income and expenses, realised and unrealised capital gains and losses relating to securities, debts and transactions in foreign currency, as well as surcharges and allowances under the advance tax scheme, etc. Financial income and expenses are recognised in the income statement by the amounts relating to the financial year. Interest income and expenses are calculated on amortised cost prices.

Tax

The tax for the year, which consists of the current tax for the year and changes in deferred tax, is recognised in the income statement for the share attributable to the profit/loss for the year, and is recognised directly in equity for the share attributable to items reported directly in equity.

Non-current financial assets

Investments in subsidiaries are measured at cost. If the cost exceeds the net realisable value, this is written down to the lower value.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

On acquisition of companies, the acquisition method is used, with revaluation of all identified assets and liabilities at fair value on the date of acquisition. The fair value is calculated on the basis of trades in an active market, or calculated using generally accepted valuation models.

The date of acquisition is the date on which the company actually acquires control of the acquired company.

Impairment of non-current assets

The carrying amount of non-current financial assets, which are not measured at fair value, is assessed annually for indications of impairment other than that expressed by depreciation.

If there are indications of impairment, impairment tests are carried out on each asset or group of assets. If the recoverable amount is lower than the carrying amount, the asset is written down to the carrying amount.

The recoverable amount is the higher of the capital value and sale value less the expected cost of a sale. The capital value is determined as the current value of the expected net cash flows from continued use of the asset or asset group and the expected proceeds from sale of the asset or asset group after the end of its useful life. A discount rate is used which reflects the risk-free market rate and the owners' minimum return on interest requirements for similar assets. The growth rate during the terminal period is determined in accordance with the standards within the industry.

Receivables

Receivables are measured at amortised cost, which usually corresponds to nominal value. The value is reduced by impairment to offset expected losses.

Tax payable and deferred tax

Current tax liabilities and current tax receivables are recognised in the balance sheet as calculated tax on taxable income for the year adjusted for tax on previous years' taxable income and for tax paid on account.

The Company is subject to joint taxation with Danish companies within the Group. The current corporation tax is distributed among the joint taxable companies in proportion to their taxable income and with full allocation and refund related to tax losses. The joint taxable companies are included in the tax-on-account scheme. Joint taxation contributions receivable and payable are recognised in the balance sheet under current assets and liabilities, respectively.

Deferred tax is measured by temporary differences between the carrying amount and tax base of assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax assets, including the tax value of tax loss carryforwards, are measured at the amount at which the asset is expected to be used within a reasonable number of years, either by setoff again tax future earnings or by setoff against deferred tax liabilities within the same legal tax entity.

Deferred tax is measured based on the tax rules and tax rates applicable at the end of the reporting period when the deferred tax is expected to become current tax. Changes in deferred tax due to changes in tax rates are recognised in the income statement, with the exception of items recognised directly in equity.

Liabilities other than provisions

Financial liabilities are recognised on the raising of a loan at the proceeds received net of transaction costs incurred. On subsequent recognition, the financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost, corresponding to the capitalised value, using the effective interest method. Accordingly, the difference between the net proceeds and the nominal value is recognised in the income statement over the term of the loan.

Amortised cost of current liabilities other than provisions usually corresponds to nominal value.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accruals and deferred income

Received payments relating to income in subsequent financial years are recognised as accruals and deferred income.
